There was in mention in this week's Scout Report that was a reminder to me. I wanted to pass on something that I think is one of the most exciting products that I saw at the last Fall COMDEX back in November. I was lucky enough to get a personal preview of the product Cubic Eye in their private suite, which happened to be at the hotel where I stayed.

While CubicEye , <http://www.2ce.com/> , is testing on the Windows2000 platform, it may be available for WIN98/ME by the time that it is released. They are touting this as a browser, if it works for Windows programs in general, I see some fantastic business uses as well as an exciting way to surf the web.

CubicEye allows users to navigate and move between five browser windows simultaneously; the windows form the sides and bottom of a cube. Make sure that you go to the site and take the tours. You will get an idea of a totally new way to do research or just browse the Web. The product exists, and it will be hot! 2ce plans to release it in the second quarter of this year. You can sign up for an upcoming beta program, but remember that you will need Windows2000.

For those of you who like to "get under the hood" , Motherboard Homeworld, <http://www.motherboards.org/index.html> , is a must.

Users planning to build a PC or looking for some information on their current motherboard need look no further than this site, one of the most comprehensive online resources for motherboards.

At the site, visitors will find MOBOT, an impressive database that allows searches by 20 specifications, side-by-side comparisons (including prices for some), and detailed spec sheets and photos. Also proffered at the site are motherboard reviews, articles, links to BIOS updates, guides (including motherboard basics), manuals, discussion boards, and much more. This is an outstanding resource for advanced and intermediate users.
